SAFER CYCLING TO STONEHENGE? CYCLISTS' CONCERNS **RAISED AT A344** STOPPING UP INQUIRY

Anyone who has tried to go by bicycle from Salisbury to

Stonehenge will appreciate the dangers currently faced by cyclists, and indeed pedestrians. The Woodford Valley is delightful, but the busy A303 is a dangerous barrier with the options of a risky crossing at Stonehenge Bottom, or a lengthy detour though Amesbury to cross the A303 via an overbridge or underpass.

The planning application for the new Visitor Centre provided reassurances that access to the attraction by cyclists and walkers would be encouraged, and one of the conditions attached to approval of the planning application 23/6/10 was that S/2009/1527/FULL dated development shall commence until (i) details of the pedestrian and cycle route along the whole of the A344, including crossing arrangements at the A303 (Stonehenge Bottom) and (ii) a scheme for reviewing such access and crossing arrangements, have been submitted to and approved (in consultation with the Highways Agency) in writing by the local planning authority."

As yet there has been no attempt to design a safe crossing point across the A303 and indeed the Highways Agency, who are responsible for the road, have put on record that they consider the current informal crossing point at Stonehenge Bottom dangerous and they do not want to encourage crossing of the A303 here. Current plans show the hatching in the middle of the road will be removed when the A344 is stopped up (since no vehicles will be doing a tight turn from the A303 here).

At the inquiry in June into the A344 stopping up order the case was put by cyclists and others that the stopping up order should not be granted because the proposals to remove the hatched traffic island would make things even more dangerous for cyclists and pedestrians. grateful to Alan Clarke for presenting the case for cyclists at the inquiry, and we await the outcome when the Inspector presents his report.

COGS were saddened to hear the news that Martin Mottram died on 3rd September. Until recent years when poor health took its toll Martin was an active campaigner for COGS as well as being involved with many other organisations and activities in Salisbury. It was largely thanks to Martin's persistent badgering of the Council that Piggy Lane - connecting Southampton Road to Milford Mill Lane - was cleared and made good for cyclists to use in the 1990s. This is now a key part of the Golden Way cycle route.

Martin continued cycling well into his 80s and he showed remarkable spirit even when poor health and immobility had confined him to a nursing home. He will be sadly missed in Salisbury. Our condolences go to his wife Rafaela and his family.

- Thanks to all who have participated in the Summer Evening rides this summer. These rides have once again proved very successful, attracting up to 20 riders each week, and continuing on into September, after the end of the official programme, due to people's reluctance to break the habit! It has been calculated that over 2,200 cyclist-miles have been pedalled during the Summer Evening rides further than Lands End to John O'Groats and back!
- COGS members have also been cycling further afield this summer with destinations including Scotland, the USA and France. Various Coggies cycled to the international festival of cyclo tourism at Flers in Normandy at the start of August where they joined with over 13,000 fellow cyclists in a week long celebration of all things cycling.
- The Highways Agency have been busy on Wilton Road. The stretch of shared use cycleway on the northern side of the A36 at Wilton is now complete and there are also various informal crossing points along the road and a cycle lane marked in the stretch heading towards St Pauls roundabout.

TRIAL LIFTING OF 'NO CYCLING' RESTRICTIONS ON TOWN PATH

Following public consultation Wiltshire Council have decided to lift the 'No Cycling' orders on the parts of Town Path where these are currently in effect—over Long Bridge and from Rose Cottage round to the Old Mill pub.

Concerns have been expressed regarding safety issues and potential cyclist pedestrian conflict, especially near the Harnham end of the path. However WC propose to take steps—such as adding mirrors and signs— to try and minimise the risks.

Sustrans publish some guidelines for cycling on shared use paths which cyclists on Town Path (and on other shares use paths in Salisbury) would be well advised to follow:

- give way to pedestrians, leaving them plenty of room
- · keep to your side of any white dividing line
- slow down when passing pedestrians and be prepared to stop if necessary
- · don't expect to cycle at high speeds
- be careful at junctions, bends and entrances
- remember that many people are hard of hearing or visually impaired. Don't assume they can see or hear vou.
- fit a bell and use it. Don't surprise people!
- where there are wheelchair users or horse riders, please give way

It is planned to hold a cycle awareness event at Town Path on 25th Oct which will hopefully include provision of free bells for cyclists who need one.
